Seeking Justice for Our Sisters: A Virtual Event Series Dedicated to Raising Awareness About Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women & Girls

SANTA CRUZ, California – For three consecutive days Monday, May 3, through Wednesday, May 5, 2021 the UCSC American Indian Resource Center will host a series of virtual events in observance of the National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG). The purpose of this event is to raise awareness about MMIWG, a human rights issue that continues to ravage Indigenous communities in the United States and abroad.

Our events will be held via Zoom on Monday, May 3 from 4 pm to 5:30 pm PST, Tuesday, May 4, from 4 pm to 5:30 pm PST and Wednesday, May 5 from 4 pm to 5:30 pm PST. It will consist of presentations delivered by AIRC interns, the Human Rights Investigations Lab at the Research Center for the Americas, and Métis artist Jaime Black, founder of the REDress Project, who will be in conversation with AIRC Director Dr. Rebecca Hernandez and AIRC intern Arely Hernandez. Presentation topics include:

- Overview of the movement
- Art, activism, extractive industries, and allyship in regard to MMIWG
- Human Rights Investigation on Northern California MMIWG
- A conversation with artist and advocate Jaime Black, founder of the REDress Project
